SESSION SUMMARY:

In this leadership lesson, John Barrett addresses a common question among leaders: "When is the right time to hire new team members?" He observes that many organizations hire out of desperation, which only allows them to stay afloat rather than advance. Barrett argues that the key to successful hiring is to do it out of design, with a vision and plan for growth. Hiring should be for where the organization wants to go, not just to alleviate current pressures. This proactive approach allows for expansion and growth, as new hires come with the capacity to take on more responsibilities, pushing the organization's limits further before hitting a wall. Barrett emphasizes that hiring out of design rather than desperation leads to thriving, not just surviving, and encourages leaders to invest in their teams with the future in mind.
